The Rector writes

The Sunday after Pentecost is **Trinity Sunday**, when we give thanks to the Father, in the Son, through the Holy Spirit. Although knowledge of the existence of God is attainable through reason alone, knowledge of his Trinitarian nature is possible only through Revelation. So we thank God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, for revealing himself to us as one God in three persons. Through the missions of the Son and the Spirit we have privileged access to God, we are able to share in the life of grace and we look forward to an eternity of beatitude, gazing upon the face of God.

This Sunday is also the date chosen for our annual **Mission Appeal**, and we will be joined by **Holy Ghost Fathers (Spiritans)**, who will deliver the Appeal at each Mass. The second collection at each of the Masses this Sunday will be to support the missionary work of the Spiritan Fathers. We look forward to welcoming Fr Christian and Fr Jerome to our Eucharistic celebrations.

Traditionally, the Thursday after Trinity Sunday is the feast of **Corpus Christi**, although in England and Wales the feast is transferred to the following Sunday. So there will be a celebration according to the 1962 missal at 11am on Thursday, but most of us will celebrate the Feast of the Body and Blood of the Lord next Sunday. Our friends at Corpus Christi, Maiden Lane, which is the diocesan shrine of the Blessed Sacrament, are holding a Eucharistic Octave throughout the coming week, details of which can be found at <https://catholicengland.org/programme/>. We ourselves will be very much involved in the afternoon procession next Sunday, which departs from the church at Warwick Street at 3.30pm, arriving here for Benediction shortly after the conclusion of the 4pm Mass.

Happily, the **first Friday** of June falls within the Eucharistic Octave, and we do so to expose the Blessed Sacrament between 1pm and 4.45pm on Friday 5 June. As usual, though, this will only be possible if a sufficient number of people enter their names against the timed slots on the list at the back of the church, so you are warmly encouraged to do so, if you can guarantee to be present, so that the Sacrament need never be left unattended.

Later in the month of June, the **Marylebone Music Festival** comes to Manchester Square, and as usual it will include our Sunday 10.30am Mass, celebrated in the Square, as part of that festival, on Sunday 21 June. This will take us close to our origins, since the Spanish Embassy Chapel, no longer in existence, was near that spot about 300 years ago. It is a matter of considerable pride that our baptismal and marriage registers go back to the 1730s.

It seems some considerable time since we saw the liturgical colour of green used at Spanish Place. In fact the last time would have been during the first half of February, before Ash Wednesday. We have been back in so-called "*Ordinary Time*" since last Monday, although there have been so many special feasts in that time that we haven't yet had occasion to opt for the colour green. It will be back during the course of the coming week, though, and on Sundays from 14 June onwards. Despite its name, there is nothing humdrum about the season of

"*Ordinary Time*", which is intended, rather, to allow us to focus on the entire mystery of salvation, not just on the particular aspects that are highlighted during the privileged seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter.

Nevertheless, the week ahead sees three feasts of martyrs, when the liturgical colour is red. On **Monday** we celebrate **Saint Justin**, on **Wednesday** we commemorate the Ugandan Martyrs, **Saints Charles Lwanga and his companions**, while **Friday** sees the memorial of the English missionary and martyr, **Saint Boniface**.

Saint Justin gave his life for Christ in the second century. An apologist and philosopher, he argued in his writings that Christianity was the natural fulfilment of Classical philosophy and he refuted many of the charges levelled against Christianity by its enemies. **The Ugandan Martyrs** gave their lives for the Lord in the course of the 19th-century evangelisation of that country. This group of martyrs includes Anglicans as well as Catholics, and it is the Ugandan Martyrs that have given us the clearest example of the so-called "*ecumenism of blood*", articulated by Saint John Paul II in his 1995 encyclical *Ut Unum Sint*, and further developed by Pope Francis. **Saint Boniface**, originally a monk in Anglo-Saxon England, became an evangelist for much of what is now Germany, he was the first Archbishop of Mainz, and he was martyred in Frisia. His remains are venerated at Fulda in Germany. So we have some great saints to commemorate this week from various periods in the Church's history.

In recent days, Pope Leo has issued his first Encyclical, *Magnifica Humanitas*, (cf. <https://www.vatican.va/content/leo-xiv/en/encyclicals/documents/20260515-magnifica-humanitas.html>) in which he encourages us to be discriminating in our use of Artificial Intelligence, which he says must be "*disarmed*" - not rejected, but managed in such a way that it does not dominate humanity. This letter is a major contribution to Catholic Social Teaching, begun 135 years ago by the Holy Father's great predecessor and namesake Leo XIII. The present Holy Father acknowledges that AI represents a great technological advance, but warns us to use it wisely, so as to build a "*civilization of love*", not simply to promote the aims of those in power. He is bold enough to take issue with some modern trends aimed at eliminating human limitations, because, as he says, "*humanity flourishes not despite limitations, but often through them*". Whoever has ears to hear, let him listen!
